The next day, on September 12, the Evansville Rose Society will be holding their fall rose show at the Washington Square Mall in Evansville, Indiana.

The Louisville Rose Show will be September 18 at the Lowe's Center just off the Gene Snyder Freeway at Brownsboro Road. Their theme is "Everything's Coming Up Roes" and the schedule can be found on the Tenarky website.

The following weekend, September 24-26, is the Tenarky Fall District Convention in Memphis. Although this is about a 5-hour trip, it will be well worth it to hear the speakers, attend the workshops, enter a few roses in the district show, enjoy the hospitality of the local rosarians and tour two rose

On another note, I encourage you to cut and take three, six or a dozen roses to friends, relatives and acquaintances. This will brighten up your corner of the world. Ann and I have been taking a bud vase or larger bouquet to friends and to our Rose Show Sponsors during the summer. You can pick up nearly new vases at garage sales and thrift shops for a dollar or less.

September Chores

September in the rose garden doesn't change very much from what we have been doing all along. We spray, dead-head, water as needed, and feed with Monty's, Mirical-Gro, or Peters occasionally. Yellowing of leaves that are not obviously old-age or black spot are calling for an iron supplement. And, be alert for spider mites. I prefer the hard spray of water under the lowest leaves of the plant rather than a chemical spray that somehow never seems to cover the areas it needs to cover. With the water spray, you must do it three or four times at three or four day intervals. Eggs deposited by the mites within hours after they themselves have hatched

adhere to the leaves tightly and keep the rapid reproduction going!

From Where Will They Come?

We have lost another "Mom and Pop" mini hvbridizer-merchant. Vernon Rickard of Almost Heaven Roses died recently from heat stroke I have learned. He had a long list of outstanding minis and mini-floras. His wife, Nancy, said at first that she was going to try to stay in business, but the word now is that she has closed. Only a couple of seasons ago Dennis and Susy Bridges decided to retire. The Bridges catalogue was loaded each year with proven prize winners and many new varieties.

In our immediate area, that leaves Whit Wells who handles only his

own roses, many of which are very fine, and Rosemania, which deals mostly with Robbie's excellent roses. Nationally, there are only a few other merchants who specialize in miniatures and mini-floras, with Nor'East being one of the top catalogues. Check the ads in The American Rose Annuals for web sites, addresses, etc.

Roses In Review

Roses In Review is a national program where we, as rose growers, evaluate roses from a given list of newer roses. Everyone should participate by checking the list published in the July/August American Rose, and evaluate only the roses which you now grow. Don't evaluate ones that you have seen growing somewhere else. The American Rose Society publishes annually a Handbook for Selecting Roses and your participation helps to set those ratings which are helpful when selecting roses to buy. Whether you report on one or many, all reports are important to get accurate ratings. Input is needed from "garden" rosarians as well as exhibitors, and from **new** rosarians as well as seasoned veterans. You do not have to be an ARS member to participate. Go to www.ars.org and fill out your report electronically. You will have to register the first time. If you need to come back and finish at a later time, you will not have to register again. For those who do not have access to a computer, you can send in paper reports. Make as many copies of the evaluation sheet as you need.
