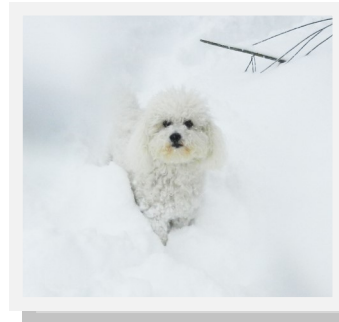


## Snow Can Be a Good Thing for Rose Bushes *by Mary Ann Hext, CR*

Last week we had over 12 inches of snow in Warren County and the drifts at our house in were much deeper. Our temperatures were below freezing for about four days; and when I took the dogs out Sunday morning about 5:30 a.m., it was two degrees. However, my rose bushes seemed snug under their layers of mulch, hay, and a blanket of snow. Now that the temperatures are higher and the snow has melted, the roses seem no worse for the unusual weather.

We have all heard that snow is a great insulator. When it covers our rose bushes and other plants, it is actually protecting them, and the moisture from the snow also provides some hydration. Snow around the mounds of mulch and hay helps to protect the base of our roses bushes from the wind and the freezing temperatures. When the snow melts, the roots and base of the plant get even more moisture.

So when we have extremely cold temperatures, snow is a good thing!. A layer of snow actually protects and benefits our roses and other plants—and it is pretty to look at for a day or so!
