## REMINDER OUR IN-CLUB COMPETITION BEGINS THIS MONTH MONTHLY IN-CLUB COMPETITION—JUNE - NOVEMBER

The competition shall consist of **ONE entry in each** of the following classes: One bloom per stem, except for sprays. Groom and fill in tags as if entering a regular rose show. Judges will comment on 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup>, and 3<sup>rd</sup> choice. The top scorer in horticulture and arrangements will be recognized at the December meeting.

Class 1—1 Single Bloom Hybrid Tea/Grandiflora

Class 2—Single Bloom Miniature

Class 3—Floribunda, single bloom or spray

Class 4—1 Shrub

Class 5—1 Specimen, Any Other Type

Class 6—Rose in a Bowl—exhibition or open large or small roses

Class 7—Arrangements—Any modern design

Since we are not having our June meeting, our in-club competition will be your rose photographs!!! You may enter one photo in each class. The photo should be saved with your name, Class Number, and name of the rose. If you don't know how to do it, include this in your email or text and I will name it for you. These will be sent to an ARS horticulture judge for judging. Send anytime until the deadline—2 pm on Sunday, June 14!

#### Public Rose Garden Report by Ann Jacobs, MR

On May 12, Bob, Dan, and I worked at the BGRS Public Rose Garden pulling weeds and cleaning. As you can see from the first photo, we have empty spaces where roses have been removed that had rose rosette. On others, the canes have been removed to see if RRV returns to those bushes. The second photo is 'Bulls Eye'.







I would like to shout out to rosarians the beautiful rose

'Carefree Beauty' rose bush in the third photo. Our society started the BGRS Public Rose Garden in the spring of 2006. One of the first bushes we put in was' Carefree Beauty'. It is today growing beautiful pink flowers. No disease and has not been sprayed as spraying is not allowed at the public garden. It has certainly held up to the name "Carefree". This is a rose you can recommend to the general public asking about planting in the home gardens.

We will continue to maintain the garden at this location through the fall.

#### June in My Rose Garden by Mary Ann Hext, CR

Things I will be doing to my roses in June:

- 1. Due to the amount of rain and the cool nights in early to mid-May, I was not able to keep to my regular spray program, therefore, I have blackspot on my climbers and some of my shrubs and floribundas. My hybrid teas, which had to be cut to the ground in early April for spring pruning and again after the big freeze on April 14, are only about 15 inches tall now, and a few have blackspot on leaves near the ground. So I am currently in the "recovering from blackspot phase" as I am spraying with Mancozeb every three days for three weeks. After four sprayings, the blackspot is almost gone. As we all know, black spot is much easier to prevent than to get rid of, so the lesson is keep to your spray program if you do spray for blackspot and other diseases.
- 2. I rarely spray any insecticide due to having a pollinator garden and a blueberry farm in the neighboring field; however, I did have to carefully spray under the leaves of four bushes for those sawfly larvae that had made holes in nearly every leaf on them.
- 3. Check for aphids and thrips and spray with an insecticide if any evidence is present when the damage to your blooms is unacceptable. I have not done this since we were not having our rose show.
- 4. Deadhead as blooms open and get past garden beauty. Seal end cuts with a water proof seal of carpenter's exterior glue. Last year I had a lot of cane damage from borers as I did not apply the glue, so this year, I am faithfully taking the time to do this when I cut back canes.
- 5. I have only had to water the roses that are in pots a couple of times as we have had lots of rain, but in June, be sure that your roses have at least an inch each week. With the higher temperatures Sunday and Monday, I will water this week if we do not get rain.
- 6. I am behind on mulching, so planning to do that to my rose beds and pollinator garden as soon as we have a few days without rain showers.
- 7. I will be applying a second application of slow-release fertilizer to my roses the first week in June following the first bloom cycle. Then I will begin applying liquid fertilizer every three weeks after that until fall rose show time when I will apply it every two weeks. If we are having fall rose shows, I probably will add another application of slow release fertilizer at the end of July.
- 8. I hope to be able to take bouquets to the nursing homes and shut-ins as soon as restrictions are lifted. I hope you will share your roses with others, also.
- 9. I will continue to take photos of my roses for the fall district show and possibly to enter in the ARS digital photo contest. The deadline for entries will be in November, so plan to enter as winners are published in the *American Rose* magazine.
